Chapel Needs 41 Votes On Anti-Smut Measures

Two major anti-obscenity bills before the Legislature this session are my Assembly Bill No. 3 and my Assembly Bill No. 14. These bills were heard before the Assembly Committee on Criminal Procedure, April 30th, and witnesses from all over California testified in favor of the two bills.

District attorneys of various counties actively supported the

entire District Attorneys' Assn. of California endorsed the two bills and recommended their passage; the California State Peace Officers' Assn. (consisting of chiefs of police and sheriffs from the whole state) endorsed the two bills; and 15 witnesses appeared with samples of obscene literature which their own little children had bought home.

THESE WITNESSES represented a cross-section of California. They include mothers of youngsters of grammar school age; mothers of high school students; lawyers, laymen representing large and powerful state-wide organizations; and people representing Catholic, Protestant, and Jewish societies. No witness repeated the testimony of the others and each had exhibits of obscene photographs, magazines, "comic books," and both

cloth-bound and paperback books.

All of the exhibits were extremely shocking and none of them could be called "art" studies. Some were simply very lewd while others consisted of detailed stories of sexual perversion illustrated by either drawings or photographs relating to perversion.

The only witnesses who testified against the two bills were women who said they

represented associations of librarians. On May 2nd, I found that one of the women had no authority to represent any association of librarians and that the other two women represented a very small group of librarians.

THERE ARE 10 members of the Assembly on the Criminal Procedure Committee. At my request, the roll was called on A.B. 3. There were two yeas. These were cast by Georg Deukemejian, Republican, of Long Beach, who represents the 39th Assembly District; and Burt M. Henson, Democrat, of Ventura, who represents the 37th Assembly District.

Richard Donovan, Republican of Chula Vista, who represents the 77th Assembly District, left instructions with the committee chairman that he wanted to be recorded as voting "aye" but had to leave to attend another committee, and would return if necessary for him to be present to cast his vote. Donovan was entirely sincere. The Honorable Howard J. Thelin, Republican of Glendale, representing the 43rd Assembly District, decided he had more urgent business in Los Angeles, and was not present for vote.

Those voting NO were the following Democrats: John T. Knox, of Richmond, 11 Assembly District; Robert W. Crown, Oakland, 14th Assembly District; Phillip Burton, of San Francisco, 20th Assembly District; Gordon W. Winton, of Merced, 31st Assembly District; Anthony C. Beilenson, of Beverly Hills, 59th Assembly District; and George N. Zenovich, of Fresno, 32nd Assembly District.

The roll call on my Assembly Bill No. 14 was a voice vote but it was the same as above.

IN ORDER to take these important bills out of the Assembly Committee on Criminal Procedure and bring them to the floor of the Assembly, I need the votes of 41 members of the Assembly. After that, I need the votes of 41 members to pass the bill to the state Senate. It is a waste of time, energy and postage to write to me, because it is obvious that I want these bills enacted into law. Please write to everyone you know in the 79 assembly districts other than the one I represent (46th) and ask them to please write to their own assemblyman and tell him they want him to vote to withdraw A.B. 3 and A.B. 14 by Chapel from the committee to the floor of the Assembly and then
