The 22-year-old Heaton is accused of shooting Guerra in a Torrance bar during an argument over a \$5 bet. He is being held without bail pending the Superior Court arraignment.

YMCA Camp Info Meeting Set Tomorrow

The Torrance Family YMCA has issued a final call to boys and girls 12 and older who would like to attend the first four YMCA summer camps.

The first three camps will depart from Torrance at 5 a.m. on Saturday morning, June 15, within hours after school is out for summer vacation.

One group will be composed of boys, 12 and older, packing in to Thousand Island Lake for a week of fun in the High Sierra wilderness.

Another group will be girls, 12 and older, spending the week in the Rainbow Falls area, sleeping under the stars and cooking over an open fire.

The third group will be girls 16 and older, backpacking along the famed John Muir Trail.

THERE WILL be an information meeting for parents and youth regarding these three early camp at the YMCA tomorrow evening, from 7 until 8:30.

A fourth summer YMCA camp will depart on Friday evening, June 21, for 10 days of water fun and exploring on the Colorado River upstream from the newly opened Glen Canyon Dam.

Designed for boys 12 and older, the trip will consist of water skiing, swimming, fishing, and boat-exploring on the Colorado River and the new Lake Powell, created by the dam. The boys will also explore remote cliff dwellings and the Rainbow Natural Bridge by hiking in from campsites on the river banks.

All camps still have room for a few more campers, and the river trip is still in need of one more fast outboard boat for the scenic jaunt.

Trustees Study Cut In Budget

Cuts totaling \$603,780 in the proposed budget for the 1963-64 school year have been recommended by school administrators, leaving another \$700,000 to go to bring the proposal into the range which could be financed from anticipated revenues.

Members of the Board of Education took the proposed cut under advisement Monday night as they continued to wade through the \$15,382,000 proposal.

Suggested cuts include \$327,000 from capital outlay, \$84,500 from instruction, \$43,000 from fixed charges, \$70,000 from maintenance, \$40,000 from transportation, and \$8,000 from administration.

A tentative budget must be ready by July 1 and the final budget when the tax rate is set in August.

Selection of a new president and other officers is scheduled at a meeting of the board of directors next week. The new president will appoint two directors at large and seven area directors to serve one-year terms.

All new officers and directors will be installed at the chamber's annual banquet June 22.
