

Legislators Heading for Special Session Monday

 The California State Legislature officially and formally adjourned "sine die," and midnight, Friday, June 21, 1963, after one of the most strenuous sessions I have experienced during my nearly 14 years in the Legislature. All my own bills directly affecting the 46th Assembly District (and the many cities in it), had been signed by the governor or

passed by both houses of the Legislature and sent to the governor for signature, with one exception.
 The single exception was a bill to obtain a small portion of the state share of horse-racing money to help create a botanical garden at the site of a trash dump. This bill passed without opposition from the Assembly committee which heard the bill on its merits, but was killed in the Assembly Committee on Ways and Means by a close vote (7 to 6, as I remember it).

THE REASON for the defeat of the bill in the Assembly Committee on Ways and Means was that some of the governor's men thought it might be possible to dip into the horse-racing money to provide funds for the large budget the governor wanted. Actually, those voting against the bill for the botanical garden were wrong because it is presently illegal to touch the state share of horse-racing money for general budget purposes.
 In addition to bills directly affecting the 46th Assembly District, I introduced several

which I believe are of benefit to the entire state of California. Some became law. Some were killed in a committee. Several have been assigned for genuine interim study.
 The phrase "interim study" in state government has two entirely different meanings. It may be a polite way of killing a bill without openly offending the author or the witnesses at the hearing who favor the bill. This did not apply to my bills.

when the Legislature is not in session for the purpose of giving people plenty of time to express their opinions, in writing, or in person. When this is done, a bill may be re-written and then enacted at the next general session of the Legislature. Sometimes it is enacted at the following budget session.
 In the months ahead, I shall give more detailed reports about my own bills and those by other legislators.
 To the best of my knowledge and belief, all the 120 legislators (80 members of the Assembly and 40 state senators)

believed that after we adjourned at midnight, June 21, we would not return until the budget session of 1964.
 THEREFORE, we had all our files packed, including the many letters we received the final few days, and packed to go home. Now our files and records are at our home offices and all of us must return to Sacramento for the special session called by Governor Brown to start Monday, July 8. Since we do not know how long we shall be in Sacramento, the best way to address mail to me

is to send the original of any letter to me at Post Office Box 327, Redondo Beach, Calif. If it is typed, please send a carbon copy to me at Room 4001, State Capital, Sacramento 14, Calif.
 If you do not make a carbon copy, there is no problem except the possibility of a delay of a day or two, because mail sent to me at Redondo Beach is either held for my return, answered here by my local secretary, or sent to Sacramento.

sible to say how long the special Legislature does not know and Governor Brown does not know.
 The clerks in the Assembly mail room told me that I received more mail during the last several months than any two or three assemblymen, except Jesse M. Unruh, speaker of the Assembly, who received an avalanche of mail, probably because he is speaker, and possibly because he takes strong stands for and against various issues, thereby invoking violent reactions, some favorable to him and some otherwise. Eventually I shall answer all letters.

UCB Reports Big Increase In Earnings

Figures for the first half of 1963 reported this week by United California Bank revealed a 37 per cent increase in net operating earnings and a 15 per cent rise in deposits over the same period the same period a year ago.

Earnings were \$1.49 per share. Deposits were up about \$325,000,000, while loans increased about 21 per cent.

Total capital funds increased from \$167,192,763 to \$167,557,379. Total resources were \$2,771,076,398.
