Warrior Spring Fair Scheduled Tomorrow

West High students and teachers are anxiously awaiting their chance to demonstrate and Johnny learns and learns through better methods from better teachers.

The faculty and student body of Torrance's newest high school will get that opportunity tomorrow. The Warrior campus is busy now preparing for the second annual spring fair, to be held from 4 to 8 p.m.

The fair, open to the public, is an outgrowth of the highly successful science fair which the school held in its first year. The new fair is an expanded concept of the original science fair, and will feature demonstrations, displays, and work sessions in almost every department.

THE BUSINESS department will present some time writing demonstrations, sales talks, a mock trial, shorthand demonstrations, and business machine demonstrations. Parents may even get a chance to try their shorthand.

Students and faculty mem-

bers in the English department have prepared a special tribute to William Shakespeare as his native land prepares to celebrate the famed playwright's 400th birthday. The Fine Arts department will present a band clinic, an orchestra rehearsal, and some performances by the choir, glee clubs, and instrumental groups.

Songs in French and Spanish, German fables, and a short play in Latin will be offered by the Foreign Language department. Demonstrations in cake decorating, baking, and cooking, as well as some modeling of newly-made clothes, will be featured in the home economics department.

SOME PROJECTS, machine demonstrations, and displays and work sessions in modern mathematics will be presented by the industrial arts and mathematics departments. Other departments, including the physical education, science, social studies, and drama

departments will present special programs.

Climaxing the four-hour open house program, station WEST

will air a special "This Is the Week That Was" program. This program, modeled after the popular television pro-

gram, was written by West High students in the speech and drama classes.

The purpose of the fair, says Gretchen E. Smith, an assistant principal at West High, "is to show the community the

kinds of things our students are doing because we are proud of the way they do them."

There is no charge for admission, and the community is invited.


