Memorial Service For Korean War Veteran Saturday

Memorial services for Lieut. Robert Lee Ramsaur, son of Dr. and Mrs. Ernest Ramsaur of Portuguese Bend who was killed in Korea, will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday, July 7, at St. Peter's Episcopal Church, San Pedro. It was announced today.

Lieut. Ramsaur, 30, was serving with the First Cavalry Division in Korea when he was killed in action on July 25, 1950. A veteran of World War II, he was seriously wounded while fighting in the Marshall Islands in 1944. Lieut. Ramsaur's body is being returned from Korea and will be interred in the National Cemetery in San Francisco.

The memorial service will be conducted by the Rev. John R. Bill of San Pedro. Lieutenant Ramsaur's parents have requested that no flowers be sent to the services but that contributions can be made in their son's memory to the Military Order of the Purple Heart, San Pedro Chapter, at 1334 West 27th street, San Pedro.

Lieutenant Ramsaur graduated from Beverly Hills High School and the University of California at Berkeley, where he was a member of Psi Epsilon Fraternity and Skull and Keys. He served as a Marine pilot in World War II.

In addition to his parents, Lieutenant Ramsaur is survived by his widow and young daughter Virginia of Arcadia; his sister, Mrs. Virginia R. Danzy of Portuguese Bend, and his brother, Dr. Ernest Ramsaur Jr., who is at present with the Foreign Service of the State Department in Germany.

Narbonne High School Teacher Killed in Mishap

Word of the death of William G. Johnson, 58, a teacher at Narbonne High school, was received here last week by his wife Mrs. Ellen Johnson of 549 Thirty-eighth st.

Johnson, according to the coroner at Rock Springs, Wyo., was struck by a car and killed while he was attempting to photograph a deer. He walked toward the deer apparently unaware of the approaching automobile.

A native of Michigan, Johnson has taught in the Los Angeles city school system since 1926. He taught woodworking, pattern making, art, metal and foundry classes at Dana Junior High for 12 years and earlier taught at Franklin High School.

An ardent photographer, he was a member of the Sierra club, the San Pedro Camera club and the Long Beach Camera club.

Johnson leaves, in addition to his wife, a daughter Joyce, of the San Pedro address, a sister Mrs. Swan Mattson of Waitpark, Minn., and two brothers, Carl of Sparrows Point and George of Towson, Md.

Miss Johnson is expected to go to Rock Springs to bring the body to San Pedro. Funeral arrangements have not been made.
