Evans, secretary of the local, at the request of the membership, wrote the following answer to Pastor Paul Wenske and the Council of Churches: "Torrance Lodge No. 785 of the Loyal Order of Moose will support any move that will help make the City of Torrance a better place in which to raise chil-

dren, improve the confidence in the brotherhood of man, and create a feeling of being a good neighbor and promote fellowship . . . this only when it does not interfere in any way with an individual's manner of worship.

Mrs. Odessa Davis, Past California Director-at-Large, was the principal speaker at the September 17th dinner meeting of the National Business and Professional Women's Club of Torrance held at Scrivener's Manchester Restaurant. Hostesses were Miss Luellie Stroh, Mesdames Maude Deininger, Mildred Brady and Laddie Johnson.

Mrs. Davis spoke of the need for orientation of new club members into the procedures of Federation mechanics and urged that prospective members have explained to them that the Business and Professional Women's Club is not a philanthropic organization; neither a cultural group nor a social group.

The four purposes for which the Federation was organized are to elevate the standards for women in business and the professions; to promote the interest of business and professional women; to bring about a spirit of cooperation among business and professional women in the United States and to extend opportunities to business and professional women thru education along lines of industrial, scientific and vocational activities.
