SALTY YARN

Those little salt shakers on California dining tables carry a big load—more than 63,000,000 pounds a year. That's the amount of table salt that Californians sprinkle on their food annually, according to estimates of American Can Company, the firm that developed the fibre salt box with the aluminum pouring spout. The container-making company's California estimate was based on a national average consumption of six pounds of table salt per person a year for seasoning. This is in addition to the salt already in food or added by canners and packers.
