

Local No. 1414 Seats New President

New Union President Installed

George Steele, for 32 years active in the labor movement, was last Thursday night seated as president of United Steelworkers of America, Local No. 1414 G.I.C. He will serve for two years in the chair vacated by out-going president Vic Teer.

Steele's long record of union service includes original membership in Local 1414 when it was organized in 1936. He was Chief Shop Steward from 1938 to 1939, and became sheetmill grievance man in 1940. This was followed by election to the chairmanship of the plant grievance committee in 1942.

During World War II, he served as chairman of the labor-management committee, and handled Allied War Relief and Red Cross service.

He served as a member of the War Man Power Commission and as a delegate to steel conference and conventions.

His fellow union members elected him president of the Torrance Local on June 26th.

Harbor JC Offering Summer Services

Yesterday, Dean J. Reyburn Hatfield, summer school director, announced that Harbor Junior College will be open to the public from 3:00 to 9:00 p.m., daily. "As a community junior college, we will offer a variety of services to those adults in the community seeking information and assistance in which our teaching staff can be of some help," stated Dean Hatfield. Special vocational interest examinations, aptitude tests, and intelligence examinations will be given, without charge, by the two College counselors, Dr. Timothy and Dean McMasters. The junior college library will be open from 3:00 to 7:00 p.m., with Mrs. Thelma Taylor and her assistant, Mrs. Marsha Savant, on duty every day to give advice and assistance to readers.

In addition to all these above services, Dean Hatfield is inviting the public to make use of the facilities in the gymnasium. Students may enroll to play tennis, badminton, volleyball, ping pong, shuffle board, and even to square dance. Lockers and towels will be supplied.

"The public is invited to visit their junior college," concluded Dean Hatfield, "and make good use of the many and varied facilities on the Campus."

P. V. Kiwanis Gets Charter Friday Night


Newly-organized Palos Verdes Kiwanis Club will receive its charter tomorrow night in ceremonies at the Palos Verdes Club.

New radio relay to Seattle extends coast-to-coast telecasts to all the West in time for the conventions.

"Live" TV now spans the West

New radio relay brings convention telecasts to all West Coast viewers

On July 7th, the Bell System's radio relay system and coaxial cables enabled the TV networks to bring the Republican Convention to the nation's television viewers—who will also see the Democratic Convention on July 21st.
