Men's Volleyball
Men's volleyball leagues are being organized by Elmer "Red" Moon, director of athletics for the city. Coach Rex Welch, and other coaches of the high school staff will be retained to conduct men's activities.

Miss Doris Avis, of the High School Girls Physical Education Department is slated to organize the women's and girl's volleyball and badminton programs, and she will also select personnel from the High School staff to assist her in conducting the co-sponsored recreation program.

The program will consist of badminton for women starting Monday at 7 p.m. in the new boys' gymnasium.

Men's volleyball follows on Tuesday and Wednesday nights beginning at 7 p.m. in the boys' gym. Also on Wednesday nights in the girls' gym will be women's volleyball.

Mixed volleyball for men and women, in the boys' gym on Thursdays winds up the four-day week schedule which will be followed until the start of the pre-season basketball leagues for men and boys which is scheduled to begin late in November.

Your participation will build the program and will also give you the opportunity to have a voice in planning the program. inside work as a clerk at one of the windows, this request was also denied her, reports indicate.

Discourages Petition
"I would suggest that the encouraging and further distribution of the petition you forwarded to me . . . be discouraged," King wrote to a postal patron who came to the defense of Mrs. O'Toole. "I can only reiterate that in my judgment it would be unwise to have stirred up among Mrs. O'Toole's patrons on the route the feeling that she has been subject to unfair treatment."

"In connection with your references of inefficiency in the Torrance Post Office, I can frankly state there has been a most difficult situation in the past several years. . . . Employees generally are underpaid, and the great turn-

over in personnel has taken place largely because of the attraction of greater compensation in private industry. . . . Nevertheless, in spite of the above, the most recent evaluation of the efficiency of the Torrance postoffice (prior to Oct. 5, 1951) rated by the postal inspectors is "excellent."

What further steps King has taken to discourage investigation of the charges in the local post office of inefficiency, mismanagement, use of government help for private tasks on the job, handling and lateness of the mail, asserted mis-handling of the registry, failure to adjust routes, and other complaints, is a matter which has caused some questioning among local patrons.

New Charge
A new charge was voiced to this newspaper during the past week, that of failure to properly put routes up for bid by senior carriers
