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## Council P-TA Hold Series of Lectures

"Democracy in Action" is the title of a public affairs forum which is planned as the first parent education series of the Torrance Council P-TA. This lecture series began October 20, and will meet each Wednesday night from 7:30 to 9:30 for four weeks at the Fern Avenue Cafeteria.

This was announced by Mrs. Ross Dorsett, council parent education chairman, after a planning committee meeting with Dr. Vernon Sheblak, director of Adult Education.

"Why Two Parties" will be the timely subject of the first lecture and discussion which will be led by Dr. Albert Karr, El Camino professor who lives in Torrance. Assisting him in the series will be El Camino professor DeLaHay, also a Torrance resident, a professor from S. C. whose name has not been revealed.

Through the cooperation of the Adult Education Department, a second series of lectures will be given in January, with Dr. Bietz, a noted psychol-

ogist as the moderator. A stimulating series in April will present several noteworthy speakers in different fields of parent education. All of the men and women in the community are urged by the council to attend and take advantage of the opportunity to increase their knowledge and understanding of present day problems.
