Stevens declared this week, however, that now was the time to start action to obtain a local courthouse. By the time it would be approved and completed, Torrance would have a population of 70,000, Stevens predicted. The city would definitely need a courthouse at that time.
Such a courthouse would be located on the new civic center site on Torrance blvd. between Madrona and Maple. It has already been included in the master plan.
Location of a court here would simplify paying of traffic fines and handling of misdemeanor cases which must now be handled through the South Bay Municipal court.

FIRE STATION: Plans for a \$50,000 South Torrance fire station at Calle Mayor and Pacific Coast highway were approved by the City Council. The station, designed by Marion J. Varner and associates, will be out for bid within six weeks. Cost of the station was covered by last year's bond election.
CIVIL SERVICE ORDINANCE: A 3-2 vote defeated quick passage of the new streamlined civil service ordinance as an urgency measure. The ordinance will now be introduced through ordinary channels. Urgency ordinances take a 4-1 vote. Voting for the Civil Service ordinance were Councilmen Albert Isen, Willys Blount, and Mervin Schwab. Against were Council Victor Benstead and Mayor Nick Drake.

CHLORINE PLANT: According to last year's agreement entered into by the John Wiley Jones company and the city of Torrance, John Wiley Jones will be permitted to store chlorine tanks at its present location though it must discontinue chlorine transferring activities at the end of this year.
RECAPTURE CLAUSE: By January 17 the city should know whether the Defense Department will waive the recapture clause on the Torrance airport triangle intended for a large shopping area, according to Jim Hall, city attorney.
DEPUTY ATTORNEY: Recommendation that a full-time deputy city attorney be hired to help the city attorney's and city prosecutor's office was approved by the City Council. The recommendation was made by City Attorney James Hall, who proposed that a \$400 monthly salary be paid.
VENTED HEATERS: An ordinance calling for vented heaters in apartments and hotels is to be drawn up. The Council won twice.
The presentation date has not yet been announced but nominations will close one month prior to that date.
Last Year's Winner
Councilman Mervin M. Schwab, then mayor, was selected for the award last year.
Name of the winner will be kept secret until the time of the presentation. Chairman of the selection board arranges with the nominator, the winner, and past recipient of the award to attend the presentation ceremonies at which time the Laughon-Whyte Citizen of the Year trophy will be awarded.
