GODDARD RETIRES FROM GP

W. R. (Doc) Goddard, assistant manager of the Torrance refinery of General Petroleum corporation, will retire August 1 upon completion of 36 years of service with the company.

Goddard, who has held his present position since 1945, joined General Petroleum as a chemist at Vernon in 1919. He became products supervisor for the Vernon refinery in 1929 and occupied the same post at Torrance, starting in 1938.

Stanford Graduate
A graduate of Stanford University and a Phi Beta Kappa, Goddard taught chemistry and physics in high schools and junior colleges before becoming associated with General Petroleum.

He is a member of the American Chemical Society and a past chairman of the Southern California section of the society.

Widely known throughout the Southern California oil industry, Goddard was honored by his friends and co-workers on four separate occasions. A. E. Thompson, manager of the company's Torrance refinery, was host at a cocktail party and dinner for Goddard at the Roger Young Auditorium June 24 which was attended by some 130 friends and co-workers.

He was presented with an inscribed Omega watch, a pair of binoculars, and a set of luggage. Goddard was guest of honor June 29 at a cocktail party at the Petroleum club attended by executives of the company including R. L. Minckler, president.

The women members of the Torrance refinery staff entertained Goddard and his wife, Ethel, at a luncheon in Torrance on June 28. Oil industry friends honored Goddard at a luncheon on July 1.

Goddard, who resided at 3851 Edenhurst avenue, Los Angeles, will spend his retirement in San Diego, residing at 711 San Fernando street.

The drawing was staged to benefit the club's building fund, of which Maestri is chairman. The fund netted almost \$1000 from the sale of tickets for the drawing.


A dance, also scheduled for Saturday night, was postponed until July 23.

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
