Planning Commission Praised By Council

A vote of appreciation was extended by the City Council last week to the members of the Torrance Planning Commission for their services to the city throughout the past year.

"The commission has processed many matters affecting the future of the city of Torrance," George Powell, secretary to the Commission told the Council.

The Commission, Powell pointed out, processed 81 tracts,

53 waivers, 24 lot divisions, and 54 special requests.

Among major issues which they dealt with were completion of a rezoning plan for North and South Torrance for shopping and commercial purposes; annexation studies of the El Nido and Victor precincts; two public hearings on the ill-fated Rolling Hills annexation proposal; and an investigation of the Torrance oil field hazards.

NEW SCHOOLS

Complications Encountered In Construction

A progress report on school construction submitted to the Board of Education indicated that a number of set-backs have delayed school construction but a September opening date is still hoped for.

The report breaks down as follows in brief:

NORTH TORRANCE HIGH SCHOOL

Expected to be completed by September. There will be certain finishing touches which the contractor will need to do after opening of school. Construction of gymnasium, cafeteria, and music room has been completed is expected around November 1.

CARL STEELE SCHOOL

Progressing slowly, largely because of the strike of operating engineers. Hope to have it finished by September.

Douglas Plant Named Among 'Significant Ten'

The Torrance facility of the El Segundo division, Douglas Aircraft company, was awarded a certificate designating it as one of the 10 most significant manufacturing plants in the United States.

Torrance location, engaged in the production of the Navy F4D Skyray, was chosen in a nationwide competition sponsored by Factory Management and Maintenance, a McGraw-Hill publication. T. E. Springer,
