Planners Meet in Torrance

Torrance played host to members of Southern California Planning Congress last week Thursday at a dinner meeting held at the Fish Shanty in Walteria, according to George Powell, secretary to the Planning Commission and master of ceremonies for the event. Dean Arthur Gallion of the School of Architecture, USC, spoke on "Why Do We Plan?" stating that planning and zoning should be based on how cities intend to restrict the use of land rather than setting up zones and the rezoning these areas for other purposes. The 150 delegates were welcomed officially by Mayor Albert Isen.

ers would not stop disrupting the meeting. The disturbance stopped presently. Another vote will be taken on the ordinance at a second reading October 18 and the ordinance will then become law within 30 days. Despite the legal need for a second reading, observers indicated that the vote will be a mere matter of formality without further controversy or possibility of change.

Petitions Credited with bringing the rabies law back for consideration and favorable action were petitions circulated by the Committee for Control of Rabies which last week presented the council with 1457 signatures and brought in 971 more signatures Tuesday night, totaling 2428 names altogether. The committee received the support of a number of P-TA groups in circulating the petitions.

Schwab's Reasons In explaining his new stand, Councilman Schwab said: "I felt that when the matter came up the other time, that we were like a duck in a pond, since none of the other cities had such a law. "I wanted it on the ballot and I had hoped it would go on the ballot. But I am convinced now that enough people are concerned about this law that if a vote were taken tomorrow there would be enough individuals who would vote it through. "That's why my position is that we should pass it now. Personally I can't see anything terrible in vaccinating a dog."

He also pointed out that a lot to-do had been made about nothing, and that the issue had become greatly exaggerated. He said, too, that while a number of unkind accusations had been made, he would not feel better by "hurling broadsides" in return.

Schwab also felt that the amount of effort that had gone into the hassle could have been used long ago for setting up a voluntary vaccination program if the people had really wanted to do something about rabies.

Mayor Praises Schwab Mayor Isen, in addressing Schwab, stated:

"First I would like to commend you for your stand. I have always felt that you were a gentleman and that you would do the humane thing."

"With every advance in science," Isen continued, "there is a lot of opposition made in honesty and good faith. Such was the case when smallpox vaccinations were first introduced. The rabies issue must be faced squarely. Since we first considered the matter, Manhattan Beach blazed the way with an ordinance modeled on Torrance's original ordinance. Manhattan was followed by Hermosa, then Redondo which first turned the law down and then passed it, and now Hawthorne."

Chain-Reaction Seen "The entire area will be more or less covered," he continued, "with Gardena to get it soon probably. Los Angeles will have it back then where it was pigeonholed in 1953, and from there it will probably go to the county and then the State."

Councilman Benstead declared that the council should act on the matter now and stop all further stalling tactics.

Opposition Councilman Blount accused the council of trying to "railroad" the ordinance through.

"I as an individual do not now or have ever opposed rabies vaccination," he continued, "but I want the kids to be protected in the American fashion."

This referred to the "compulsory" nature of the ordinance. He also accused the pound of
