## Air Raid Sirens to Be Tested

Los Angeles city's air raid sirens will be tested at 11 a.m. Friday, October 28. The test will consist of a steady one-minute blast followed by one minute of silence, then a one-minute wailing or undulating sound.

Colonel Richard F. Lynch, director of the Los Angeles Office of Civil Defense, again pointed out that the "alert" signal which means enemy attack is possible, actually is a steady three-to five-minute blast. The "Take Cover" signal, which means enemy attack is expected at any moment, is a three-minute wailing sound.

The Civil Defense official said that the Department of Public Works is at the present time installing new and more powerful attack warning sirens throughout the city which will provide every area with adequate sound coverage. The new system is expected to be completed by June, 1956.

Following Friday's sounding of the sirens, the next test will be held on November 25.

After giving oxygen, the ambulance crew rushed the baby, who has been suffering from a respiratory infection, to Harbor General Hospital. Authorities there said the officer's quick thinking had apparently saved the boy's life.

Slogan for the 1955-56 Community Chest campaign, "Feel Good! Give Big!" was revealed to residents of Los Angeles and surrounding communities last week by means of billboard space, window cards in stores and businesses, radio spot announcements and a flashing sign nightly on the Goodyear blimp.

James Visceglia, harbor area campaign chairman, said that in harbor area business districts, Boy Scouts have distributed counter cards which bear the likeness of a sleeping man wearing a big smile and balancing a Red Feather on his nose. The slogan, "Feel Good! Give Big! Your Community Chest Needs Your Fair Share!" is seen on the top of the card.

Devised by a volunteer committee from the American Association of Advertising Agencies, the Chest slogan and design were used in a "teaser campaign," beginning several weeks ago, when on donated bill board space all over the city, the words "Feel Good!" and the picture of the sleeping man appeared, arousing much comment and interest.
