


**Barrington Will Head Kiwanians**

**Civic Group Sets Meeting**



**Check Your Furnaces, Chief Warns**

With the coming of the fall season and cooler weather, furnaces or wall heaters will be coming into use again for the first time in many months.

In order to receive the maximum efficiency and eliminate unnecessary smoke and odors from such appliances, these few simple precautions should be taken, Fire Chief J. Jay Benner stated:

1. Remove the floor grating or wall panel and see that accumulations of lint and foreign objects are removed from the enclosed heater area.
  2. Before replacing the floor grate or wall panel, turn the furnace on and check the burners for adjustment.
  3. If the flame, either on the main burner or pilot light does not appear to be properly adjusted, call the repair service department of your local gas company.
- By taking these few simple precautions now you may save yourself several anxious moments and many hard-earned dollars later, Chief Benner said.

**Mental Health Clinic Short On Telephones, Help Urgent**

Contributions are still urgently needed by the Harbor District Mental Health Service to pay for additional telephones made necessary by an anticipated step up in professional services. The Harbor District Mental Health Service functions as an

auxiliary to the San Pedro branch of the Los Angeles State Mental Hygiene Clinic which provides low cost psychiatric, diagnostic, treatment and referral services to 23 communities in the Harbor-Torrance-South Bay areas.

While \$31 has been donated from the San Pedro, Lomita, Torrance and Redondo areas, an additional \$119 is required to meet the total \$150 required for installation of more phones at the clinic.

"Without these extra phones, it will be impossible to provide adequate service for the professional staff who will be here at the clinic on a five day a week schedule instead of the present one day a week," Mrs. L. K. Walsworth, coordinator, explained.

Donations should be sent to the Harbor District Mental Health Service, 731 S. Beacon Street, San Pedro. Additional information may be obtained by contacting the clinic at Terminal 2-6464.

Response to a previous appeal was made by the Lomita Presbyterian Church Mothers' Club—13 members donating \$5; 15 members of the Seaside Hillers, a mother's group from Seaside Heights in the Torrance-Redondo area donated \$25; an individual contribution of \$1 was mailed to the Harbor District Mental Health Service.

Included among the 23 communities served by the clinic, in addition to Torrance are Lomita, Dominguez, Harbor City, and Keystone.

The board of directors, who donate their time and services, asks individuals and organizations in the cities served by the clinic to help meet the \$119 still needed.

While the communities will be informed when the quota is reached, any possible surplus will go toward meeting the year's budget of \$5,000. This July '56 through June '57 budget pledged is the communities' responsibility in maintaining the clinical service.

The additional full time professional staff has been made possible through funds voted by the State legislature.


