ADULTS MAY STILL ENROLL IN EVENING SCHOOL CLASSES

Enrollments are accepted for most Adult Education classes at any time during the year. It is not necessary to wait for a new semester to enroll in the class of your choice.

Adults who wish to obtain a high school diploma, prepare for employment or improve their employment status, prepare for community leadership, provide for personal needs on

the job or for leisure time, will find courses to fit their needs at the Torrance Evening school. A few of the offerings are listed below:

Mathematics: Algebra and General Math courses are offered every Monday and Wednesday evening. Instruction in the use of the slide rule will be started in the near future.

Mr. Iverson, Torrance high school instructor, is in charge.

Business Education: Typing and Shorthand classes are now in progress. Work on business machines will begin soon. Instructor Mack Landar's former students placed second in national competition in a recent shorthand contest. Mrs. Jean Melton is the instructor of the adult class at North high school.

Art Instruction: Under the instruction of Mr. Oliver, El Camino College, water color and oil classes meet every Tuesday and Thursday evening.

Woodshop: Woodshop classes are held at both North high and Torrance high. Well-equipped shops are available for students to work on projects in which they are interested.

Craft Classes: The following craft classes have openings: RUGMAKING (all types)—This class meets every Wednesday from 1-4 p.m. at the Civic auditorium, under the direction of

Mrs. Wilma Johnson. LAMP SHADE MAKING—Classes are held at North high, El Retiro park, and Newton Elementary school. Instructor is Mrs. Viola Boas. MILLINERY—Instruction is given Tuesdays from 1-4 p.m. at the Civic auditorium. Mrs. Pamela Grubb is the instructor. KNITTING—Projects from television slippers to ladies' dresses and suits are being completed under the instruction of Mrs. Gordon. The class meets every Monday from 12:30-3:30 p.m. at the Woman's club, 1422 Engracia.

Real Estate: The real estate class is held from 7:30-9:30 p.m. every Wednesday. Lyle Albro is the instructor in charge.

Over 1000 adults are presently enrolled in the 46 Adult Education classes in Torrance. Many are working for high school diplomas. Some are foreign born preparing for American citizenship. All classes are free of any tuition charge. The only charge made is for materials used by the individuals.




