FREEWAY RE-ROUTING OPPOSED

The Torrance Chamber of Commerce is strongly opposed to any re-routing of the San Diego freeway, it was announced today by President A. E. Thompson.

Thompson said that his organization has been most critical of the lack of appropriations for early completion of the vitally needed San Diego freeway, but that through the efforts of united Centinela valley and South Bay communities hopes are much brighter.

"Any attempt to re-route the San Diego freeway now," said Thompson, "would necessarily result in unjustifiable and costly delays."

The chamber leader pointed out that he is in sympathy with the Lawndale Chamber of Commerce in its efforts to re-route, but that the endeavor is similar to "closing the barn door after the horse is out." Thompson added that his group stands ready to assist the Inter-City Highway committee and has notified its leaders, Chairman Wilburn Baker of El Segundo and Assistant Chairman Nickolas O. Drale of Torrance, both city councilmen.
