

Council Shelves Rubbish Problem

A policy on granting exemptions from municipal rubbish pickup was shelved for further study, after City Manager George Stevens presented several questions to the City Council Tuesday.

The city manager said that requests for exemption from paying the monthly \$1 collection charge have been received from some single family residences, and that if granted, this will prove an administrative impossibility.

He also said that businesses and apartments have been permitted to seek private collection and be exempted from the city charge.

Stevens pointed out that it costs \$1.40 per dwelling unit to collect debris, but that a number of persons are delinquent in their bills.

'You Auto Buy Week' Campaign Takes Hold as Dealers Stage Sales Drive

Torrance automobile dealers launched "You Auto Buy Week" here with a parade in which they displayed both automotive and female beauty.

The procession through the downtown area last Friday was part of the dealers' campaign to spur sales. Beauties entered in the Miss Torrance Chamber of Commerce contest rode in the cars.

Although no specific Torrance reports are available yet, a Los Angeles area survey indicated a 60 per cent jump in automobile sales in the four-day weekend debut of the sales campaign.

While no figures were available for other durable goods sales during the same period, it is believed that the "Buy-Now-Buy Something" drive will result in substantial sales increases in other lines.

Sponsoring automobile dealers, Herman Miller Plymouth, Paul's Chevrolet and Vel's Ford, pointed out that they are hopeful that the sales campaign will reverse the economic trend and bring better business, and more jobs.

The campaign runs through May 4.

Thieves Tear Up Factory

Burglars broke into a furniture factory in a string of thefts, but managed to do 10 times as much damage as obtain loot.

Set May 7 as Deadline for Strike

Aircraft unions have served notice on four major aircraft firms that they intend to stick by their May 7 strike deadline unless new agreements are reached.

A strike vote has been taken by the International Machinists Association and the United Auto Workers who have contracts with the Douglas El Segundo Torrance, Santa Monica and Long Beach plants, Lockheed, North American Aviation and Convair.

If a walkout is called, it will affect the 4500 employees at the Douglas Torrance plant as well as other workers in the aircraft industry centered in Southern California.

Negotiations are being continued between the unions and Lockheed management while no meetings have been scheduled this week with the other companies.

Leaders of both unions have instructed membership to set up strike machinery in preparation for the midnight, May 7 deadline.

The unions have asked for pay increases, severance pay and the union shop.


