### Patients' Awareness of Health Problem Can Help Prolong Life, Doctor Claims

It is hard for people to realize that before the year 1900 only three diseases — smallpox, scurvy, and rabies — could be prevented with specific prophylactic agents, and according to medical history, specific drugs were available for only three conditions, namely, malaria, worms and scabies. In the year 1958, it is a simple but shocking truth that much more is known about health protection and disease prevention than is applied individually or collectively.

Magic and mystery in matters of health and sickness went out of existence at the time the patient was no longer kept in ignorance of the nature of his malady. Today, the emphasis is on enlightenment, and active efforts are made by private and public health agencies to inform people on matters relating to personal and public health.

Many medical men are of the opinion that a large number of people die every year who might have lived longer, and many ailing persons might have remained healthy if only they had been better educated or more conscientious in matters relating to

health protection. Failure to prevent illness that is preventable is costly in several ways. In many instances people give little thought to good health habits until forced by sickness to do so. The periodic physical examination is postponed or ignored, and little time is given to relaxation, or attention paid to the proper diet.

True, there are many individuals who, with apparent immunity, can ignore all health rules and yet live to a ripe and vigorous old age relatively free of disabling ailments. These lucky people happen to be born with the right combination of ancestral genes and chromosomes that somehow enables them to withstand an extraordinary amount of wear and tear. In other words, they are born with what, for want of a better term, is called a good constitution. These individuals are the exceptions. Most people must observe good health habits if they wish to remain healthy and active in the later years of their lives.

But nothing that the finest physicians, surgeons, public health officers, and other health workers can do will take care of the person who refuses to do his part toward maintaining or regaining his health. Nature, like the proverbial mills of God, is slow but inexorable. Sooner or later she exacts her toll from the human body when it is unwisely or carelessly treated.

### City Cancels Airport Lights

Airport Manager Jack Egan was overruled by the City Council this week when it decided to spend \$16,000 on taxi-way improvements rather than lighting at the airport.

Malcolm Neal, member of the Airport Commission, said that the money which was previously allocated for illumination, would be better spent on the construction of a high speed taxi strip.

Egan who last week received approval for expending \$16,000 in city funds and received another \$35,000 matching funds from the CAA for taxi lighting, said he had not changed his mind.

But councilmen agreed with Neal and scrapped the lighting allocation. Councilman Victor Benstead opposed the reconsideration, snapping,


