Ryan Reports Net Increase

Net income of the Ryan Aeronautical Company, after provision for federal income taxes, was \$1,201,875 for the first nine months of fiscal 1958. T. Claude Ryan, President, reported today. Earnings for the period were equal to \$2.68 a share on the 448,760 net shares outstanding.

The company president informed shareholders in an unaudited interim statement covering the nine months ended July 31 that stockholders' equity during the third quarter increased by \$303,700, bringing the company's stockholders' equity to a high of \$13,659,493, equal to \$30.44 per share. At the end of the comparable period of fiscal 1957, stockholders' equity was \$11,910,107, equal to \$26.54 per share on present shares of \$31.85 on the 374,000 net shares outstanding July 31, 1957 before payment of a 20 per cent stock dividend last October.

Net sales and other income for the nine months totaled \$50,624,710 up from \$46,244,618 a year earlier.

Merchants Back School Bonds

The Downtown Merchants Division of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce has joined its parent organization in urging a "Yes" vote on the School Bond Issue.

In making the announcement, President Del Nadeau said his group endorsed the \$15,000,000 Bond Issue for two basic reasons. First, and paramount, Nadeau said, is that the School District must be bonded to capacity to obtain State Aid. Secondly, the new bond issue will not increase the tax rate, the merchants leader stated.

The Downtown Merchants have joined the action of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce and the Industries Tax Committee in strongly urging a "Yes" vote.
