

WEHRHAN STARS AS SOUTH UPSETS TORRANCE 27-14

Led by Bob Wehrhan before an overflow crowd of 6000, an inspired South High eleven upset favored Torrance High, 27-14, at the latter's field Friday night in the first inter-city scholastic game in Torrance history.

The Spartans victory was spearheaded by bulldozing full-back Bob Wehrhan who led his gridders on to hand Torrance their first defeat of the season. South dominated play from the opening kick-off when after four plays they forced the Tartars to punt. A bad pass from center recovered by guard Mike Robbins set up the first South score. When the Spartans put the ball in play on the Tartar's two, it took one plunge over center by

Bill Hargrove to put South ahead 7-0.

The Spartans scored again late in the second quarter when Wehrhan recovered a Tartar fumble on the 48 yard line, four plays later reserve tailback Jim Hawkins ran over from five yards, Hawkins then passed to end Roger Smith for the extra point.

The third quarter opened with Torrance trying desperately to get on the scoreboard recovering an on side kick at the fifty yard line.

Torrance looked like a completely different team on offense with halfbacks Joe Montgomery and Howard Taylor running for two straight first downs and a 15 yard penalty against South putting the THS men back into the game, then a 12 yard pass from quarterback Don Dobrick to end Cliff Wiemer scoring the touch-down.

Pat Stewart conversion split the uprights and the scoreboard read South 14 Torrance 7 at the end of the third quarter.

Torrance came right back when Montgomery the star of the game for THS, received a Spartan kickoff and ran 85 yards for the second Tartar score, Stewart's conversion again was good.


The fighting Spartans again came right back and put on the first sustained drive of the game going 55 yards in seven plays with a one yard fourth down jump pass from Hargrove to Roy scoring the final points of the game.

Torrance with a 1-1 record travel to Beverly Hills next Friday in a afternoon game, while the league leading Spartans with a 8-0 record have a well deserved bye.

Duck Identification Card Available at Local Offices

Duck hunters who want to carry a small chart which will help them identify the three species of ducks, for which the aggregate limit is two this year, can get such a chart from their local office of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife of the U.S. Department of the Interior.

The leaflet can be carried in a shirt pocket or even in a billfold. It shows pictures of the birds—canvassback, redhead and ruddy ducks—with the identifying characteristics described.

The leaflet also has an artist's sketch showing one of the fundamental principles of good duck hunting: "Don't shoot until the eyes of the duck are visible."

The leaflet also has some material about the duck stamp. It is designed to give the hunter as much information as possible in capsule form. A copy of the 1959 hunting regulations may also be obtained at the local Fish and Wildlife Service office.
