Speakers for the morning session were Mrs. Icy M. High, state citizenship chairman, presented by Mrs. Lester Peterson, a district chairman, and Mrs. E. L. Berdrow, state safety chairman, presented by Mrs. John Beckenholdt.

Dianas to Sponsor Polio Inoculations

A non-profit polio clinic will be held at Aviation High School, corner of Aviation and Manhattan Beach Blvds., Redondo Beach, Tuesday, 7 to 9 p.m., under the auspices of the National Foundation and the Redondo Beach Dianas, Marina District, CFWC, junior membership.

First, second, third, and booster shots will be available at a cost of \$1. All proceeds over and above the cost of the vaccine and supplies will be donated to the National Foundation.

The Los Angeles County Health Department recommends that the second injection be given one month after the first; the third injection be given seven months to one year after the second; and the fourth or booster injection be given one year after the third.

Anyone under twenty - one years of age, unmarried, and not in the armed forces must be accompanied by a parent or guardian or bring written consent.
