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City's Business Men Return to Classroom

Torrance business leaders who took part in Education-Business-Industry Day last week heard Superintendent J. H. Hull suggest the schools ask for an additional override tax to continue the present educational program.

Some 100 persons took part in the program, with business and industrial leaders visiting classrooms.

The superintendent told the businessmen that rising costs and the need for competitive teachers' salaries will require more money.

Hull also said the district continually seeks better ways to educate children. Experiments are encouraged, including such programs as the multigrade.

Assistant Superintendent S. E. Waldrip said Torrance schools also are big business, with a \$20,000,000 budget.

"In your business, you don't expand until you can afford to do so," Waldrip told the group.

"In our business, we can't refuse to serve our customers, so we expand whether we can afford to or not."
