Pop Warner Teams Organized

LOCAL SQUADS LOOK FOR SUPPORT OF YOUNGSTERS

Pop Warner football will make its initial debut this fall in Torrance, it was announced today by the association's local publicity director, W. J. Nesenson. The newly organized group will field two teams during the coming football season, Nesenson revealed. The teams will be members of the South Bay Pop Warner Conference which includes entries from Redondo Beach, Gardena and Palos Verdes. Inter-sectional games will be scheduled with other teams in Southern California.

The newly formed association is headed by Dick Wiser, president, Pat Hogue, vice-president, Edward Nicodemus, secretary; Ralph Hogue, treasurer; and Ron Alexander as athletic director.

The Pee Wee team, consisting of boys age 9 to 11 and weighing 65 to 90 pounds will be known as the Torrance Vikings. Head Coach Bob Jensen has not yet named his assistants.

The midget team, made up of boys age 10 to 12 and weighing 75 to 110 pounds will be known as the Torrance Chargers. Head Coach Ron Alexander has named George Cole and Lloyd Daniels as his assistants.

Registration and try outs for the two teams were held Aug. 13, 14, 20 and 21 at the Torrance Park.

Full scale practice began Thursday, Aug. 25 at Ryan Pony League Field. Approximately 130 boys began competition to fill the rosters of the two teams. At the final cut each team roster will be reduced to 28 boys.

The season is tentatively set to open at Serra High School Athletic Field in Gardena Sept. 17, 1960. Complete schedules of the new Vikings and Chargers are not available at this time. The teams expect to complete a schedule of four conference and six non-conference games. The home field is still undecided.

The new association hopes for a successful season and intends to add a bantam team next year. A bantam team would include boys 13 and 14 years old and weighing up to 130 pounds.
