## Austin, Linninger on All-Bay League Football Roster

Joe Austin of South High and Pat Linninger of North were placed on the first team Bay League, it was announced today by Hugh Cameron, the league's secretary. The coaches, in their vote held earlier in the week, also placed Bob Behrhan and Mike Andrews of South on the second team and Dan Shupp, Al Becker, and Rick Jacobs from North.

Austin, who quarterbacked the Spartans offensively and defensively all year, won similar honors last year. Linninger, who has been alternating at end and backfield, was named to the mythical power-house squad as an end.

Last Sunday Bill Wade connected for 14 of 23 passes thrown. The Rams won the game in the last minute and the passer of note was Frank Ryan. Los Angeles sports writers, the Ram's team, and the bench (Waterfield, Pool, etc.), wrote and talked about how great a guy was Ryan. In their discourse they barely mentioned the Vanderbilt ace.
