

Summer Session Participation By THS Senior Told

Notice of the participation of John Alter, Torrance High School senior, in the Summer Session Program for High School Students at the University of California at Santa Barbara, was received this week.

Admission to the program for high school students at Santa Barbara was based upon the student's previous scholastic record and letters of recommendation from the student's teachers.

Subjects John studied included—2 classes of 2 units each: History 39—History of California and Pacific Coast, and Music 15—Music History and Appreciation.

Approximately 200 high school students participated in the University's program. Students were required to take one of three prescribed courses and one elective course. The students attended the regular summer session of six weeks' duration and lived on campus.

John stated enthusiastically that the summer session program for high school students gave him "a taste of college life. High school students

Construction was started this week on the first unit of a master plan for the Redondo-Torrance Church of Religious Science on their two-acre site located at Prospect and Knob Hill Avenues in Redondo Beach, according to Doyace L. Miller, building chairman.

This unit will house the Sunday School, administrative offices, and a social hall, which will be used, for the present, as the sanctuary, seating three hundred.

Plans for the building were drawn by Howard Van Heuklyn, associate of Risley and Gould, architects. C. W. Driver, Inc. are the general contractors.

The completed master plan, excluding land, will represent an investment of approximately \$375,000.
