### Torrance Youngsters Learn Home Repairs as Basic Shop Program

Elementary school courses designed to teach Torrance youngsters the rudiments of home handwork are now in progress in the seventh and eighth grades of local schools.

Traditional industrial arts programs have moved away from emphasis on making wooden articles, footstools, shoe boxes and whatnots, toward a more varied and practical program, according to school officials.

During the 24-week period of shop training given seventh and eighth grade boys there is increasing emphasis on home mechanics, including basic instruction in electricity, plumbing, and other needed repairs. Youngsters also will do work with plastics and metal.

#### NO JOURNEYMAN

School officials emphasize that Junior won't be ready to complete all home repairs and alterations, but he will be equipped a little better to

handle such matters. Leading educators, including Dr. James B. Conant in his latest report, feel that industrial arts training is valuable for students of this age.

Several of the shop programs include small, framed reproductions of homes, complete with various types of wiring—common to most houses. Youngsters get instruction about the basic factors—sockets, wiring, types of hook-ups, overloads, transformers, circuit breakers, and, of course, safety.

#### FACE NORTH

When rooms face north, brighten them with decorative schemes using clear light-reflecting colors. Larkspur blue and mint green, accented with gold and oyster white is a favorite combination. Panel walls in champagne colored west coast hemlock for warm, textured background.

#### CORNER SINK

A stainless steel corner sink with two contour bowls is an excellent choice for a small kitchen. The right-angled placement of the "wells" saves valuable space, and provides counter surfaces on both sides as well as in the rear.

#### OVERSIZE BEDROOM

Turn an oversize bedroom into a double bedroom for two children without cutting the larger room up into tiny cubicles.

Use a room divider which is fairly open, but still defines the two separate areas.

A good way to achieve this result is to build identical desks, one on each side of the divider and at opposite ends, but leave the area above the desks open. In this way, one child can look directly into the other part of the room, but, since the desks are at opposite ends, there is no conflict or diversion when the boys or girls are studying.

Mooney Jr., assistant director of instruction in the division of physical sciences, during ceremonies at the college's second chemistry seminar this week.

King was selected for the \$50 award and a letter of commendation by the college faculty in general chemistry from a group of six top students completing the course during the 1949-60 school year.

King's chemistry work at El Camino has been accomplished under Instructor Philip Dunn of Torrance. He plans to continue in the field at UCLA.

Principal speaker at the seminar was John McQuerry, chemistry instructor, whose topic was "The Separation of Copper and Cadmium."

Chemistry seminar series was inaugurated in 1959-60 and consists of presentation given by members of the chemistry faculty or outstanding scientists from other institutions. These presentations are designed to assist the chemistry faculty and majors in keeping up-to-date with developments in the various fields of chemistry.
