

### Area Honors First L. A. County Man Appointed to Cabinet Rank

J. Edward Day, who will be Postmaster General of the United States in President John F. Kennedy's cabinet, this week was honored by the Board of Supervisors, with Supervisor Kenneth Hahn presenting him with a "king size" picture postcard bearing the following message:

"The Board of Supervisors and six million people of Los Angeles County join in congratulating and wishing you every success as you undertake one of America's most important jobs as Postmaster General of the United States."

"We know that as a member of the Cabinet, you will

give sound advice and wise counsel to President John F. Kennedy in carrying out his heavy responsibilities as President of the United States."

#### TRIBUTE PAID

Joining with Supervisor Hahn in paying tribute to the new Postmaster General were 20 key officials of the Los Angeles Postoffice and Postmasters of a number of cities in the County.

Day is the first resident of Los Angeles County ever to serve as a member of a presidential cabinet. He is leaving his position as executive vice-president in charge of western operations of the Prudential Insurance Company to accept the cabinet post. Day is a former law partner of Adlai Stevenson and formerly served as Illinois Insurance Commissioner.

Since coming to Los Angeles in 1957, he has been active in civic affairs, serving on the Governor's Business Advisory Council, the State-wide Water Development Commission, and in many other community and charitable activities.

### Pacific Telephone Company Will Build \$850,000 Torrance Information Center

Nearly one million dollars will be invested in a new South Bay home for Pacific Telephone, it was learned last week.

Imposing \$850,000 edifice will house commercial, information and employment, and will be constructed at Torrance Blvd. and Arlington Ave., in Torrance. Allison and Rible, architects, are completing working drawings for the 22,000 square foot building, which will blend with the general architecture of the neighborhood.

Two-story building will be of reinforced concrete construction for floor slab, columns and walls, except for the north side, which will be of glass reducing and opaque glass panels framed in aluminum. There will also be extensive glass areas in the first floor wall of the public area facing the street.

East side of the building is to be of decorative concrete with exposed panels above. Building will be set back from the street, with the

front entrance to be through a landscaped court. Building is designed to house an information center utilizing the latest type information equipment, public business offices, company employment offices, and various employment. Facilities. Entire building will be air conditioned. Plans provide for future construction of an additional floor.
