

Council Defers Action on Area Dump Permit

The Torrance City Council Tuesday evening deferred for two weeks an application for a zone variance submitted by R. A. Watt, which would enable the applicant to establish a cut-and-cover dump between 178th and 179th St.

Protest on the application was submitted by Thiem Industries, Inc. which owns four acres adjacent, and is presently manufacturing pharmaceutical products. Dust and smoke would prove to be unsanitary in their manufacturing procedures, they reported.

Western Union Completes Move to New Torrance Home

Keeping pace with the rapid growth of business and industry in Torrance, Western Union completed the move from its former location at 1915 Carson Street to its new office at 1612 Cabrillo Avenue, Torrance, last weekend.

The new office is an ultra-modern installation incorporating the latest technical advances of this high speed electronic era. The office had been located at the former address since Nov. 1950.

"The new and expanded facilities are designed for the continued growth of the community and the rapidly increasing need for telegraph service," it was stated by J. W. Inwood, district manager of Western Union in the Los Angeles metropolitan area. "The new office will provide not only for the expansion of business and industrial communications, but for the most efficient handling of all social and personal telegrams and telegraphic money order service in this area."

direct wire connections that will link a number of firms in this section with the new Western Union office."

The Torrance office, managed by Reggie Vejar, operates directly into Western Union's high-speed message center in Los Angeles, one of fifteen area centers serving the entire country. When an operator at Torrance types a telegram, it flashes to the big Los Angeles Center. There a button is pressed and an electronic brain speeds the message on to its destination without manual re-transmission at any point. As a result, telegrams from the Torrance office flash anywhere from coast-to-coast in minutes.

The renovated office has been provided with air conditioning, fluorescent lighting and the new high-speed telegraph machinery. New switchboards, equipment cabinets, operating tables and other equipment have been installed by a force of engineers and technicians.

"Service to the residents of Torrance will be improved as a result of the installation of new high-speed telegraph equipment and complete rearrangement of operations. The equipment placed in operation includes the most modern automatic printing telegraph machines and di-


