Torrance YMCA announced the 1961 current support campaign goal and key leadership this week. The local youth agency will seek to raise \$35,500 to carry on the work with over 6,000 boys and girls in Torrance, Lomita and Riviera during 1961.

Annual YMCA drive will be launched by a kick-off breakfast this Saturday morning from 7:30 until 9 a.m. at the International House of Pancakes. The entertaining event is open to all citizens without reservations. More than 200 volunteer campaigners will receive instructions during the program.

Torrance YMCA campaign is the largest annual fundraising event in the city and all funds collected remain in the community to maintain more than 115 youth clubs meeting regularly and underwrite 15 separate sessions of summer camp for local boys and girls. YMCA's entire operating budget is attained through this campaign, since the agency is not a recipient of Chest funds.

Starting with boys or girls six years old, the local YWCA conducts varied programs of education, recreation, training and fun for all ages through high school and col-

lege. In addition to the popular youth programs, more than 1,900 families are enrolled in Torrance YMCA family program. A full-time staff of three professional youth workers is augmented by five well-trained part-time program directors.

**CONTACT 3,000**  
More than 3,000 families and firms will be contacted in an effort to finance the YMCA adequately despite a cloudy economic situation. Torrance YMCA campaign operated in 1960 for 3.7% of its goal, the lowest such campaign cost in metropolitan Los Angeles.

Following the breakfast Saturday, YMCA kids will disperse in many directions for Y fun: Littlest children will depart in busses for a Knott's Berry Farm excursion; Two hundred will play in the mountains and desert for week-end outings.

## Sepulveda Work Progressing On Schedule Reports Supervisor

Supervisor Burton W. Chace reported Tuesday that construction work on Sepulveda Boulevard, from Figueroa St. to Main Street, in the Carson area, is progressing on schedule.

Chace said the north barrel of the proposed four-lane highway has been paved and the west-bound approach aprons completed.

Traffic will soon be diverted onto this completed leg while the south half of the roadway is being constructed, he added.

The improvement, approximately one-half mile in length, consists of reconstruction to alleviate critical structural deficiencies, and widening the street to four lanes.

Chace stated that completion of this project will provide improved access to the proposed Harbor Freeway and also be an important step

in the ultimate development of this major east-west highway.

The section of Sepulveda between Vermont Ave. and Figueroa St., through which the freeway will pass, is being improved by the State Division of Highways with County funds and is being coordinated with the construction of the Harbor Freeway. Plans have also been completed for the widening of Sepulveda from Normandie Avenue to Vermont.

Supervisor Chace pointed out that the planned development of Sepulveda will make it the longest continuous County Master Plan Highway. He also noted that cooperation between public agencies in programs of this kind result in great savings for the taxpayers and also provide convenience for the motoring public.

## Hospital Incorporates as Non-Profit Institution

Riviera Hospital changed its name, and its basic function this week as officials announced that its title would become Riviera Community Hospital that it was now incorporated as a non-profit institution.

Founded in 1957 the 93 bed hospital has provided much-needed medical and surgical service to the community.

Operating under a three year accreditation issued by the American Hospital Association, the facility plans to make no changes in its present medical staff, nursing roster nor technical personnel.

Located at 4026 W. 226th St., near the corner of 228th and Kent St., the hospital is widely recognized for its maintenance of medical standards.
