

### Harbor Area Welfare Council Sets Mental Health Meeting on Feb. 20

An open public meeting on the subject "Our Community's Mental Health Needs—a Challenge to Community Planning," was announced this week by Mrs. Herma Tillim, program chairman of the Harbor Area Welfare Planning Council. The meeting will feature the work of the Joint Committee on Mental Health, which is spearheading efforts to implement the mental health survey of Los Angeles County in the Harbor-South Bay area.

A panel of outstanding local persons will discuss the critical needs facing the community in developing adequate services for people with serious emotional problems or mental illness. Projects which are in the planning stage for salvaging some of these needs will also be discussed. On the panel will be Dr. Walter Nowers, private psychiatrist, discussing "The Challenge to Community Action"; Dr. Loui Kaplan, assistant superintendent of the Torrance Unified School District, discussing "The Challenge Facing the Schools"; and Dr. David Dingilian, special assistant to guidance at Harbor College, discussing "The Challenge for Prevention Through Mental Health Education."

Also on the panel will be Dr. Jack Lomas, president of the Southern California Psychiatric Association, who will bring information on new trends and programs from the county and state levels.

Meeting will be a dinner affair beginning at 7 p.m. on Monday, Feb. 20, and will be held at the Retail Clerks Hall, 25949 Belle Porte Ave., Harbor City. Reservations should be made by Feb. 17 at the Council office, 1427 South Pacific Ave., San Pedro, TErminAl 3-5227.

### Air Force Seeks College Graduates To Fill Key Executive Positions

In an attempt to meet the increasing demand for young officers to fill key executive positions, the Air Force has placed emphasis on its Officer Training School Program for college graduates.

The program, open to both male and female college graduates, provides the opportunity for qualifying applicants to obtain a commission as an Air Force second lieutenant upon completion of a three month training course.

According to Master Sergeant James P. LeFevre, local Air Force recruiter, college seniors are not required to wait until graduation to apply. Applications may be submitted up to 135 days prior to graduation but in no case will acceptance be final until after graduation.

To qualify, an applicant must be between 20½ and 27½ years of age; a U.S. citizen; of excellent moral character; and meet the prescribed mental and physical standards. Female applicants must be single with no dependents but his restriction does not apply to male applicants.

### Printing, Tech Illustrators' Classes Offered in Local Adult Night School

In answer to industrial requests for Technical Illustrators, the Gardena Adult School, 1301 W. 182nd Street, is offering Technical illustration on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, stated William Johnston, principal. The course is a basic technical drawing course, covering perspective, layout, enlarging, exploded use, inking, and isometric drawing, and will feature the commercial aspect of three-dimensional drawing.

**AIRCRAFT SKILL**

While Technical illustration, as such, is considered an aircraft skill, there are many opportunities in private business, such as assemblies drawings and pictorial illustrations, for qualified individuals.

Persons enrolling should have had high school basic drafting or art, or equivalent experience.

Instructor, David Matthews, veteran commercial artist, will present the course.

In another announcement, Principal Johnson stated that the adult school will offer a basic course in Printing on successive Tuesday evenings from 7 until 9:30 p.m. beginning, January 31.

Printshop facilities at Gardena High School are now very adequate to offer adults in the Gardena Valley area such a class, stated Sil Ledesma, instructor. The shop is presently equipped with two linotype machines, an automatic horizontal cylinder press, in addition to other items of equipment.

**VARIOUS AREAS**

Printing course will cover the following areas of printing: Shop and theory, Hand composition, Stone work, Press work, figuring and cutting, Machine composition, Basic design and layout, Two-color job printing, Compression work, Platen press work, Automatic small cylinder and large cylinder press work, Trade terminology, Safety and related phases of the printing industry, Emphasis on student designed projects and a unit of basic bindery. The class is designed to meet the needs of students at all levels ranging from basic work to highly advanced techniques.

Ledesma, instructor, was educated in Compton, is a graduate of Compton Junior College and Long Beach State. He is presently in his third year of teaching print shop at Gardena High School. He has had extensive commercial and teaching experience.
