

### Flashing Red Light Protects Children

"The flashing red lights on a school bus actually are designed to speed up traffic by lessening the number of stops for other vehicles," California Highway Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden recently stated.

"Far from being a hindrance, the lights indicate to cars approaching from both front and rear when a stop is required. Before the flashing red signals were installed on school buses, drivers of other vehicles were required to stop whenever the bus halted," he pointed out.

"This resulted in a number of unnecessary stops, and caused some traffic tie-ups. Adoption of the flashing red lights was intended to smooth out traffic flow by reducing the number of mandatory stops."

The law provides that the school bus operator must activate the flashing red lights when he stops to load or unload children who must cross the street on departing from or to reach the bus.

Drivers approaching from either direction are required to stop upon viewing this flashing red signal, except that on a divided highway, drivers proceeding in the direction opposite to that of the bus need not stop, the commissioner said.

### Expansion Plans Told by Officials At Marineland

Marineland of the Pacific announced today that it has purchased an adjoining parcel of land which will serve as a keystone long range plan for expansion of the shows at the oceanarium.

William F. Monahan, vice-president and general manager, reported that the 19-acre parcel will increase the usable land at Marineland by 50 per cent. The original grounds of Marineland comprised 70 acres, part of it being rugged cliffs and rocky beach.

The new land was bought from Palos Verdes Properties for a price of approximately three-quarters of a million dollars. Capital Company acted as sales agent.

Monahan said: "The new parcel, a triangular piece of land fronting on Palos Verdes Drive South and lying between the two present access roads to the oceanarium, is a vital part of our long range expansion plans.

"Master planning for the new area is under way by the firm of William Pereira and Associates."

### Lazy Day Bread

Raisin Casserole Bread is made to order for those days when you don't have the time or the energy to make a bread that requires kneading. It's made from a batter so there's no kneading; it has only one rising time, and is baked in a casserole so there's no time spent shaping the loaf. Yet the finished bread has all the goodness and tenderness that you expect from yeast-raised bread.

Allow about 20 minutes for measuring and mixing, 50 minutes for rising and 50 more minutes for baking and you'll have your lazy-day bread on the table just 2 hours after you take out the mixing bowl.

**Raisin Casserole Bread**  
2/3 cup hot water  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 cup shortening  
1 cup very warm water  
2 packages or cakes Fleischmann's Yeast, active dry or compressed  
1 egg, beaten  
3/4 cups sifted flour  
1 cup seedless raisins  
Mix together hot water, sugar, salt and shortening; cool to lukewarm. Measure 1/2 cup very warm water into mixing bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm water mixture. Add egg, flour and raisins. Stir until well blended, about 2 minutes.

Let rise in warm place, free from draft, about 50 minutes or until more than doubled in bulk. Stir down. Beat vigorously about 1/2 minute. Turn into greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake immediately, in hot oven at 400 deg. F. about 45 minutes. Makes 1 loaf.
