

Local Educator Named to Federal Post; Will Head Defense Education Division

Charles R. Huff, Harbor College instructor of mathematics and astronomy, has been selected chairman of the astronomy section for Southern California by the National Defense Education Administration, according to an announcement this week by Stuart M. Friedman, chairman of the college division of mathematics and physics.

As chairman, Huff attended a meeting of junior college science instructors at El Camino College on February 10, and will preside over a similar meeting at San Bernardino on March 10.


A number of Torrance residents are planning to attend the Beverly Hills event, so transportation may be arranged with the Committee.
