News Of Servicemen

LARRY COON, interior communications electrician third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Coon of 1726 Watson Ave., and **RICHARD W. BOUCHER**, fireman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Boucher of 1618 Crenshaw Ave., all of Torrance, are serving aboard the guided missile frigate USS Mahan on a five-week cruise in the Pacific.

The Mahan departed San Diego, Calif., Feb. 16, and is scheduled to visit Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and Acapulco, Mexico, before returning March 21.

The Mahan is the third ship named in honor of Rear Adm. Alfred T. Mahan, whose, citing the importance of sea-power for nations, became world famous. The first Mahan, a destroyer, was decommissioned in 1930, and the second was sunk in the Leyte Gulf, Dec. 7, 1944.

The new frigate was commissioned Aug. 25, 1960, three years after the laying of its keel in the San Francisco Naval Shipyard. It is equipped with a d v a n c e d electronic equipment and armament, including the Terrier surface-to-air missile and the Asroc, an anti-submarine rocket.

DONALD S. MORRISON, a damage controlman first class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Winfield S. Morrison of 21006 Valirie St., Torrance, is serving aboard the ocean minesweeper USS Constant, operating with the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

The Constant, a unit of Minesweeper Division 92, is scheduled to return to Long Beach, Calif., March 24, completing the seven-month cruise.

The minesweeper visited Japan, Korea, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Manila, Guam Midway, Hawaii and the Philippines. While in the Philippines, it delivered approximately 10 tons of school books to the Batangas Province.

RUSSELL C. SKINNER, radarman seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Skinner of 2139 231st St., Torrance, departed Norfolk, Va., Feb. 20, aboard the destroyer USS Willard Keith, for an eight-week refresher training exercise at Gauntanamo Bay, Cuba.

The Keith, which completed a major overhaul in mid-February, is making the cruise as a normally scheduled post-shipyard overhaul exercise.

ARMY PVT. JOHN L. ANDRADE, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Andrade, 1414 W. 216th St., Torrance, recently arrived in Korea and is now serving with the 7th Infantry Division.

The 7th Infantry "Bayonet" Division is one of two highly trained U.S. Army combat divisions which have remained in Korea since the Korean war as part of the United Nations forces maintaining a shield of defense against aggression.

Andrade, a truck driver in the division's 17th Transportation Battalion, entered the Army in September, 1960, and received basic training at Fort Ord, Calif.

He attended Narbonne High School, Lomita, and was employed by the Quality Aluminum Awnings Company before entering the Army.
