Complete Leases for Next Group Of Stores for Del Amo Center

Finalization of leasing negotiations for the next increment of stores scheduled to open in the Del Amo Shopping Center in Torrance have been completed, according to Pat O'Melveny, vice president of the Del Amo Estate Company who is in charge of leasing operations for the multi-million dollar center.

In all, ten stores will occupy the newest section of the master planned 600 foot central shopping mall currently being developed. Agreements have been signed with Thom McAn Shoe Store, National Shirt Shop, Del Mar
