

El Camino Cinder-Hoppers Host ELA's Track Stars at Home Meet

El Camino College will play host to the strong East Los Angeles track team tomorrow at 3 p.m. in the Warrior's first home meet of the season.

El Camino cindermen won their first dual meet of the year by defeating Harbor College 70½ to 51½ to mark the first time El Camino has emerged victorious over Harbor since the two schools began competing in track. Both teams scored seven firsts, but Warrior depth was the winning factor.

Hollywood Park Racing Calendar Off the Presses

Hollywood Park's 1961 racing calendar for the 55-day thoroughbred race meeting that opens Wed., May 10, is now available to the public without charge and may be obtained by sending a card to Racing Calendar, Hollywood Park, Inglewood, California.

Jim Richardson was Harbor's crutch, placing first in the 440, 220 and broad jump. Jim Frazier captured first in the 120 high hurdles and high jump and tied for first in the pole vault.

The colorful brochure, which contains attractive scenes of and pertinent information about the "track of the lakes and flowers," lists the complete \$1,200,000 stakes program. Conditions of the feature events, such as distance, added money and age and sex of the thoroughbreds eligible are listed from the opening stakes, the \$20,000 Hollywood Premiere on May 10, to the final, the \$75,000 Sunset Handicap, on closing day, Mon., July 24.

Dennis Hansen, nucleus of the El Camino cause, was victorious in the mile and 880 and anchored in the relay. Jack Henderson took first in the shot put and discus. Bruce Carrington triumphed in the 220 low hurdles, and Gene Blankenship won the two-mile run for the Warrior team. Bob Severence, Joe Herzog, Hans Jensen, and Dennis Hansen teamed up to run away with the one-mile relay.

Metro Conference Schedules Four Meets on Friday

Metropolitan Conference track and field athletes go into the second week of the season this Friday with four feature meets scheduled.

Last Week Long Beach CC, Valley College, El Camino and Bakersfield College won their opening dual meets with a sprinkling of good marks included in the four get-togethers, Valley's Steve Matthews established a new school and meet record in the mile in his team's 72½ to 49½ winover East L. A. College. Matthews mark was 4:17.6 and is the best this year. The Metropolitan Conference record is 5:20.2. Matthews also ran a 1:56.9 in the 880 for a new meet record and coming mighty close to the Metro mark of 1:54.3 set by former Valleyite Tom Webb. Teammate Lou Fasano tossed the discuss 153' 11" for the best mark of the year.

Other good marks last week included Long Beach's Willie Martin and his 48.5 in the 440, and Jim Richardson's 23' 8" broad jump mark against El Camino. Richardson is a top athlete from Harbor.

This Friday's Track and Field schedule features Bakersfield College at Valley, East L. A. at El Camino, San Diego at Santa Monica, and Long Beach at Harbor.

TT Tracksters Separated by Only 7 Points

Only seven points in championship standings separate upstater Dick Dorresteyn, San Pablo flyer, and Dick Hammer of Lakewood as they prepare to lead a field of more than 100 motorcycle jockeys in the 100-lap TT steeplechase classic Sunday, March 26, at Ascot Stadium, Gardena.

The race, the first annual Jimmy Phillips Memorial, is being tabbed the "Indianapolis of the two-wheelers" and racing director J. C. Agagianian points out it is the greatest test of man and machine in 'cycle racing this year.

Dorresteyn, Hammer & Co. will fly over a 10 ft. barrier 100 times as they weave around the hazardous six-tenths of a mile course with its nine right and life turns.

167 TO 160
Dorresteyn, who swept the boards last time out, goes into the program with 167 points compared to 160 for Hammer. Jack Simmons, Artesia, is third with 144, followed by Johnny Muchkenthaler, Gardena, 120; Clark White, Bakersfield, 116; Dave Bostrom, El Sobrante, 110; Jack O'Brien, Santa Monica, 98; Eddie Kretz, Monterey Park, 95; Gary Sowell, Inglewood, 90; and Jim Goldsmith, Long Beach, 70, to complete the big 10.

Veteran Joe Leonard of San Jose, three times Grand National champion, will be a dangerous challenger to Dorresteyn and Hammer aboard his familiar No. 98, while other threats include Sammy Tanner and Skip Van Leuwen, Bellflower; Elliott Schultz, South Gate; Don Wehrman, Hayward; Chuck Minert, Whittier; and Don Hawley, Inglewood.

At least three novice riders will be in the bulging starting field of 33 for the 100-lapper along with the fastest 30 qualifiers regardless of class.

All - important qualifying March 26 starts at 12 noon with racing at 2:30 p.m. Stadium gates open at 11 a.m.


