

Do not have the fall removed from the leg of lamb. Season. Place skin side down on rack in open roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer so the bulb reaches the center of the thickest part of the leg, being sure the bulb does not rest in fat or on bone. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (300 F.), basting every half hour with French dressing, until done. The meat thermometer will register 175° F. for medium done; 180° F. for well done. Allow 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 hours for roasting.

Play days, when you will need new clothes, are just around the corner. The fashions look fresh and are exciting. If you start now there is still time for careful planning, so each outfit can be a conversation piece to prize in the days ahead. So get out the tape measure and scissors, the basting thread and sewing machine.

The first step is the shopping spree! After a careful inventory of last year's leftovers, take courage and pocketbook in hand. Shop the fabric department of your favorite store. Shop other fabric collections. Even shop the ready-to-wear departments so you know what is strictly 1961 in mood.

GAYER FABRICS
This Spring you will find fabric departments gayer and brighter than ever. Color has exploded into clear, vibrant shades; it departs from the traditional, to spot light the colors we have been hesitant to am up with. Hot orange, pimento red, lettuce greens are all headline news. Gold continues strong. Lilac and lavender bloom everywhere, and blues are bold and brave! Banana is a new shade-beige with a yellow cast. In fact yellow comes in a rainbow of shades including lemon, lime,

banana, etc.

Choose the colors that do most for your complexion, and your needs as well. There are the new darker cottons in stained glass prints that don't need washing after a single wearing. Succumb, to, to the flagrant, spirit-lifting prints that make each wearing an adventure. As exciting as prints are the new-Sanforized-Plus woven cottons whose appeal is in texture, or in lustrous silken-like elegance. Tapestry patterns are produced in two tone effects which make impressive spectator sportswear. There are ribbed repps, bengalines, attomans, even moires, that tailor to perfection in suit and jacket dress combinations. The woven cottons so popular in dad's sports shirts are proving the newest fashion choice for classic shirtwaist dresses. They are in the Oxford weaves, pin stripes, small checks.

If these aisle-upon-aisle of rainbow fabric displays tempt you with their increased freshness and variety, the fabric department will please you too with its new helpfulness. Now the Textile Identification Act, effective March, 1960, is well into action and it orders that fabrics must be

labeled to tell the consumer the generic name of the fabric: cotton, linen, rayon, etc. You'll find some scientific puzzlers too—such as acrylic and polyester—but remember these are generic, not brand names. A few questions and a little comparison will quickly orient you.

TAGS OR LABELS
You will also find the new Sanforized-Plus tags or labels on cottons and dacron-cotton blends from many of the leading mills. These are your guide to satisfactory wash-and-wear. They promise that such fabrics can be maintained with a minimum of care, even with machine washing; that fabrics are crease-resistant in action, and that garments made from them won't shrink out of fit. An interesting sidelight is that the Sanforized people have invented an electronic tester which is used to take the guesswork out of how much ironing a wash-and-wear fabric needs. So, you see, this tag means what it says.

If you do buy wash-and-wear cottons—and with the hot months ahead, you are very likely to—there are certain precautions to follow in both the buying and sewing of them.

Christian Science Lesson Sermon

The oneness and supremacy of God will be emphasized at all Christian Science services on Sunday. "He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son." This declaration from John's second epistle (1:9) is the Golden Text of the Lesson - Sermon on "Doctrine of Atonement."

The opening citation from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy states, "Jesus taught but one God, one Spirit, who makes man in the image and likeness of Himself,—of Spirit, not of matter." Later she says, "As a divine student he unfolded God to man, illustrating and demonstrating Life and Truth in himself and by his power over the sick and sinning." (pp. 94, 117)

Affirming man's oneness with the Father, Jesus says in John's Gospel, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly. I am the good shepherd: good shepherd giveth his life for the sheep. . . . The works that I do in my Father's name, they bear witness of me. . . . I and my Father are one" (10:10, 11, 25, 30).
