## El Camino Only Junior College in U.S. With 20,000 Year-Old Fossil Displayed

El Camino College earth science students believe that their school may have the distinction of being the only college in the United States which will display bones of a prehistoric mammoth excavated from their "own backyard."

Following the recent discovery of the nearly complete fossil of a prehistoric "elephant" reported to be 20,000 years old, students Don Johnson, Diane Neilson, Ray Bivens, Carl Martin and Edwin Edwards, sought and received permission from curators of paleontology division of the Los Angeles Museum to collect parts of the backbone, rib cage and pelvis of the mammoth, which was discovered in the Dominguez Hills area.

Working from instructions given them by Leonard Bessom, the museum's senior preparatory paleontologist, the students set up an overnight camp and began the process of casting the bones for removal.

**IMMACULATE WORK**  
Because the bones are so friable, the students had first to clear the bone surface of dirt and coat the exposed areas with resin. Several layers of plaster of paris, wet newspapers and soaked gunny sack were laid over the segments and allowed to dry. The entire cast was dug around and under and then pulled from the ground.

## Harbor College Summer Session Curricula Ready

More than 100 courses will be offered by Harbor College during the six weeks summer session from July 10 to August 18, according to an announcement today by Dr. Robert V. Bacon, Dean of Summer Session.

The number of courses represents an increase of 32 over last year and is the largest number ever offered during the summer in the history of the college, Bacon said.

Courses to be given in the eight divisions of the curriculum include technical, business, liberal arts, and science courses.

Among individual subjects are physics, chemistry, biology, mathematics, business, English, speed reading, electronics, printing, architecture, art, drafting, philosophy, speech, nursing, history, psychology and many others.

**TUITION FREE**  
All courses are tuition free, carry regular college credit, and meet from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Mondays through Fridays. No admission tests or transcripts are required. Any high school graduate or person 18 or over may attend.

Counselors will help students plan their programs during registration and will be available during the entire summer session.

Registration for all students will be held from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 6 to 8 p.m. on Cay 18 and 19 and on July 6 and 7. No individual appointments are necessary for summer session registration.

"Summer session is particularly valuable to four groups: high school students who want to get an early start on college programs or to make up course deficiencies; college students who want to complete units toward graduation; employees who wish to improve skills and prepare for better positions; and everyone interested."
