Marineland Restaurant, which has presented a number of living musical legends in its cocktail lounge, has unwrapped another with this week's opening of Wild Bill Davidson, considered by Dixieland experts and fans to be one of the world's best cornetists.

Launching melodic rockets in the "Porpoise Room," the famed jazzman and his band, which becomes an upbeat show when the lid comes off, moved into Marineland Restaurant for a five-week engagement. They will entertain nightly except Mondays through May 21.

The blending companion instruments, led by Davidson's hot-noted horn, offers polished jazz and jazz on the roar. The maestro's cornet reaches moments of high artistry, the kind that keeps unadulterated jazz alive.

Marineland Restaurant's new show was a crowd-pleaser in New York at the Roundtable, Eddie Condon's and the Embers. The side-men are excellent technically and in collaboration. Their free-and-easy music, laying a carpet under Davidson's hot and wailing horn, is now on tap in the "Porpoise Room."
