The 11-week training period emphasized physical conditioning, the history and mission of the Marine Corps, customs and courtesies, hygiene and sanitation, and basic military subjects.

The competition is scheduled to end May 4.

During these matches, top marksmen from units throughout the 13-state Fifth Army area are competing for trophies and the opportunity to represent the Fifth Army at the All-Army championships at Fort Benning, Ga., in June.

Lieutenant **Nichelson** entered the Army in 1952 and is regularly assigned as supply officer of the 28th's Headquarters Company at the fort. Nichelson is a graduate of Wahoo High School. His wife, Edna, lives in Junction City, Kan.
