A crusade by a Torrance couple to aid needy Indians has caught on in their community, and has attracted attention of many of their friends and neighbors.

Mr. and Mrs. Muzik, realizing that a great many of the Indians in the greater southwest were in need of help, were sending clothing with friends, always wishing they could go themselves. Last year they were able to see a dream come true. They were able to collect over 3½ tons of clothing and 40 cases of canned food. They, then, set out with their three daughters, Sherrie 14, Thelma 13, and Valesta 8 months, to deliver the articles where needed.

Through their friend, Mrs. Eleanor Ami of Winslow, Arizona, who is Hopi and T'watami Indian, they were able to visit and stay on the reservation. They stayed at the home of Mrs. Annabell Homi, in Pollaca. Mrs. Ami acted as their interpreter and guide. The family were able to distribute the food and clothing directly to the family's and then spend some time sight seeing, going to the Indian ruins and visiting their new found friends.

They have plans for their trip this year around July 4, so they can attend the powwow in Arizona at the same time. But this year their will be six in the family, their new daughter, Hiley, who was born three months after their trip of last year, will also be going.

The Muziks are once again collecting food and clothing and would appreciate help from any of their neighbors in Torrance and Redondo or any organizations. Muzik said. "The load looked quite large until we saw how many there were who could use a little help."

Mrs. Muzik is vice grand regent of Court Our Lady of Victory, Catholic Daughters of America, and on the board of the Hollywood Riviera Business and Professional Association, and the Board of the Hollywood Riviera Democratic Club. Muzik is a member of the Elks club in Redondo Beach and has been in business in South Redondo for the past 13 years.
