

### HJC Professor Is Sailor at Heart

College instructor from September to June, and ship's purser from June to September—such is the double life led by Harbor College social science teacher Don Rogan.

During the winters the popular professor teaches anthropology, history, and geography, and during the summer he gets first hand information about the subjects he teaches.

Rogan has had sea fever since he was a young lad, and he still pursues his travels with the same hope and excitement that he felt then.

He first learned of his love for the sea as a deck boy during the summer of his 14th year. By the time he was 18, his unborn aspirations quickly unfolded when he found himself aboard a freighter as a beginning purser.

But he wanted a formal education too; so he attended the University of Southern California for a B.A. and later earned a Master's degree in social science by attending college at night and holding down various day positions, such as public accountant, salesman, claims agent and longshoreman.

Since obtaining his education, Rogan has added 5 years and 17 summers to his travel record, and 18 years to his teaching career.

He has visited Europe, Asia, South America, Africa, the Pacific Islands, Australia, and New Zealand, and has taught at Moorpark, Huntington Park and Harbor, where he arrived in 1955.

Like many seamen, Rogan enjoyed most the beauty and variety of the Japanese islands, which he says are the favorites of almost all sailors.
