What should the average family do in case of atomic attack?

Three South Bay Women Feted by County Board

Three women and two organizations from the Torrance Health District of the County Health Department were recognized for community service by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors at the 14th Annual Awards Luncheon of the Citizens' Advisory Committee to the Bureau of Public Health Nursing, announced Dr. B. A. Kogan, district health officer.

Presentations were made by County Supervisor Ernest E. Debs to Mrs. Margaret Snuffin of Gardena for 1,000 hours of volunteer service in the Department's clinics and to the Sandpipers of Manhattan Beach for sponsoring 1,500 hours of volunteer time. On hundred hour citations were received by Mmes. Eleanor Warden of Torrance and Margaret Pettitt of Manhattan Beach. A 200 hours certificate was made to the Palos Verdes Junior Women's Club.

1400 HOURS
According to Dr. Kogan, 1400 hours were donated last year by the 61 volunteers who worked in the clinics of the Torrance Health District. In the 14 districts of the Department, a total of 25,000 hours donated by 720 volunteers. The doctor said that the volunteers' efforts had saved the taxpayers money and man hours of labor, thus permitting those savings to be applied to improving public health services to the residents of the areas served by the Department.

Some of the duties the volunteers perform under the supervision of the nurses are the weighing and measuring of babies in the baby clinic, welcoming new mothers and teaching clinic procedures to patients coming for the first time, performing simple diagnostic tests, and in general, assisting the nurses so they can spend more time in consultation with the patients.

Polio Clinics Slated by Four Local Hospitals

Doctors and hospital in South Bay will join forces May 25 for the first of a series of monthly "polio clinics," according to Dr. William A. Taylor, president of Southwest District of Los Angeles County Medical Association. Hospitals involved in the program will be South Bay, Torrance Memorial, Little Company of Mary, and Riviera Community.

Dr. Taylor described the community-wide polio inoculation program as a public service effort involving the combined resources of South Bay's fast-growing medical resources of doctors and hospitals.

Hours at each hospital May 25 during which persons may receive polio inoculations will be from 4 through 8 p.m. A \$2 charge will be asked. "The polio clinics will be continued at the four hospitals for an indefinite period on the last Thursday of each month," Dr. Taylor said.

The program is under auspices of the southwest district of LACMA as part of its professional concern in assisting and contributing towards health programs in the greater South Bay community. Physicians will be made available at each hospital inoculation center through the southwest district medical organization.

Hospitals will provide space, facilities and personnel. Dr. Taylor said. Other assistance will come from hospital auxiliary and aid groups, it was announced.

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
