The new facility is a 23-bed, \$150,000 ultra-modern hospital located in the colorful Monument Valley area of Southern Utah and Northern Arizona. Its opening has been made possible by the gifts of members of the local Adventist Church.

"There are many persons in Torrance who have given help to the Navajos in months past in many ways," Pastor Goffar said, "and to this large group also, the opening of this new facility will undoubtedly bring joy."

According to Pastor Glenn Goffar, the new hospital is the only one in a 100-mile-either-way area some 600 miles from Los Angeles and located on the Arizona-Utah border near the "Four Corners" area where Colorado, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico meet.

THOUSANDS
The new hospital will care for thousands of Navajo Indians living in the area as well as greatly increased numbers of tourists who visit Monument Valley. The hospital is located in Rock Door Canyon, an awesome and inspiring area of towering red rock monuments that tower hundreds of feet into the air.

In the swirling desert sands below these giant monuments live thousands of malnourished Navajos, many of whom have died in the past because no near-by hospital has been available.

Pastor Goffar said the Seventh-day Adventist Church has maintained a small medical clinic in the area for the past 12 years but not until two years ago were funds available to build the new hospital.

NEW FACILITY
The nearest hospitals to the area in which the new facility is located are 100 miles in either direction — north or southwest — at Monticello, Utah, and at Tuba City, Arizona. Often desperately ill Indians would die in the Clinic's ambulance during the 100-mile race to these hospitals in the past.

Now it is expected many of these deaths will be prevented because of the new facility.

Pastor Goffar said Cree Sondetur, Glendale, president of the Southern California Conference of Adventists, represented the local congregation at the opening of the new hospital. Also participating was Paul Jones, chairman of the Navajo Tribal Council and Annie Wauneka, chairman of the health and welfare commission of the Navajo Tribal Council.
