I feel that we are very fortunate to have such good protection that our understaffed force gives us and council should make every effort to keep our officers, and also a program such as this would no doubt entice other qualified men to apply for a position on our force.

I find by checking with other cities that we are far behind in police protection, at times when you call, you have to practically be put on a waiting list. They have 22 square miles to cover and a population over 103,000 to protect, yet we have only 105 in the department. This includes clerks, secretaries and etc. In our juvenile department we have only six, with the average age in Torrance being approximately 25, we have been very fortunate so far.
