Chemist Finds Compound

Jack C. Hileman, El Camino College chemistry instructor, recently synthesized the compound technetium carbonyl, which is the last missing member of the manganese sub-groups carbonyls.

Hileman, currently on leave from El Camino College, is engaged in graduate studies in chemistry at the University of California at Los Angeles. His leave is supported by a National Science Foundation Science Faculty Fellowship.

The chemistry instructor prepared the new technetium compound under the direction of Dr. Herbert D. Kaesz, UCLA chemistry department, and was assisted by fellow graduate student, Dale K. Huggins.

News Spotlights Work

The journal of American Chemical Society reported Hileman's work and was placed in the national scientific news spotlight when reported in the Chemical and Engineering News. Hileman will present a paper to the Division of Inorganic Chemistry of the American Chemical Society on Friday, Sept. 8, as a part of the 140th national meeting of the ACS, in Chicago.

During Hileman's year at UCLA he has been appointed visiting scholar and elected to Phi Lambda Upsilon, honorary chemistry fraternity. He will continue his graduate studies on a sabbatical leave next year at the University of the Pacific where he will participate in a program of new teaching methods of college chemistry developed by Dr. Cobb of Stockton College.

The merchants of the City of Torrance recently were warned by Chief of Police Percy G. Bennett that there is a possibility of a forgery ring operating throughout the Torrance area.

This ring is believed ready to drop fictitious print payroll checks on the following companies, known nationally as flour milling concerns. The valid company check will appear as "California Milling Corp." P. O. Box 3488 Terminal Annex LA re, Security National Bank, head office, L.A. authorized maker L. W. Herwig.

The fictitious check will bear the name "Ace Hi" number series 7600 to 7800. "General Mill, Inc." San Francisco, California Bank of America, Market and New Montgomery Sts., San Francisco is true name. Authorized to sign as maker is G. G. Simpson.

Fictitious check will bear imprint of Gold Medal. The valid Pillsbury Co. of Los Angeles, Cal.—Bank of America, Atlantic and Whittier branch has authorized makers J. Lien for the flour mill, M. L. Hunt for the mix plant, and G. Brey for reference division. The fictitious checks on Pillsbury, Co. will read only Pillsbury.

Checks are believed to be in amounts of \$168.00.

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
