Warne Sees No Large Water Ills

During the decade remaining before Feather River Project water arrives here, Southern California as a whole faces no insurmountable water problems, William E. Warne, state director of water resources, said Friday.

Speaking to members of the Central Basin Water Association, he attributed Southern California's present secure water position to the vision of long-range planners who initiated construction of the Los Angeles and Colorado River aqueducts.

He emphasized that today's planning must include careful studies of ground water basins for use as future "warehouses" for imported water.

"We can and must direct our water project planning farther and farther ahead if we are not to get caught short," he cautioned.

Warne predicted that entry of the State's water bonds on the nation's bond market—foreseen as still more than a year away—will enhance California's credit rating because they are evidence that the state has her economic destiny firmly in hand.

As examples of practical vision of the sort which vitalizes California's economy Warne cited the state's plans for the Central Valley Project in the 1930's, the California Water Plan adopted in 1959, present Delta Water Project plans.

He noted the north coastal water resources investigation, present studies of ground water basin management, and the new Porter-Dolwig Ground Water Protection Law.

Space Equipment Builds Autoclave at Kerr Plant

Space Equipment Corporation reported this week that it is constructing a second autoclave at its Kerr Products division plant in Torrance, to service its growing business in missiles and space structure fabrication.

The fully-automatic autoclave will be the largest of its type in the west, according to John N. Kerr, Kerr Products president.

The new equipment is

part of a long-range facilities improvement program to keep Space Equipment Corporation geared to new requirements arising from the nation's rapidly expanding space and missile program, Kerr said.

To be designed and constructed under the cognizance of Kerr engineers as a company-funded project, the new autoclave will be used in fabrication of components as missile cases, rocket and launch tube containers, missile nose cones, fairings and structures.

The new autoclave is scheduled to be in operation shortly after the first of the year.

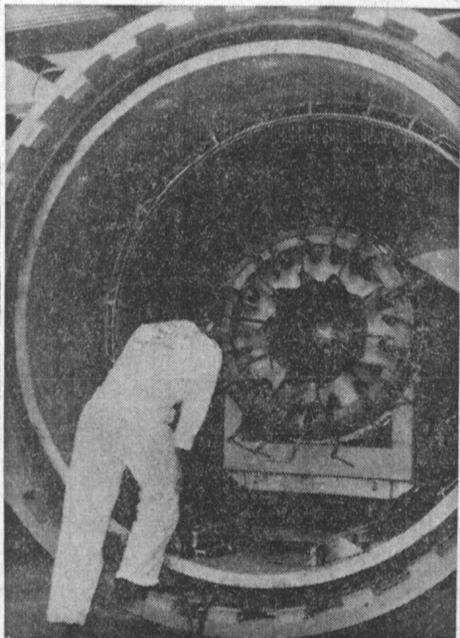
Kerr Products designs and fabricates aerospace plastic and rubber products. These include missile motor nozzles, space probe guidance antennas, rocket container tubes and low-pressure ducts.

"The new unit will be the only one on the West Coast that can accommodate the larger sized structures arising from the trend towards larger missiles, and higher curing pressures," Kerr said.

The new Kerr autoclave will handle parts up to 12 feet in diameter and 24 feet long.

Working temperature will be 650 deg. F. and working pressures up to 250 psi.

The current Kerr auto-

clave can accommodate parts up to 7 feet in diameter but 19 feet long.

Major advantage in fabricating nose cones and fairings by the autoclave method is that thick plastic laminates can be laid up and

cured in one stage to obtain the required strengths.

The autoclave method reduces costs and labor time in fabricating plastic missile parts and improves the quality of parts, according to Kerr.

Stauffer Has Large Sales Increase

Net sales of Stauffer Chemical Company in the three months ended Sept. 30, were \$57,110,000 compared to \$56,734,000 in the third quarter of last year.

Earnings for the third quarters of 1961 and 1960 were \$4,198,000 or 44 cents per share and \$4,876,000 or 52 cents per share respectively, according to company spokesmen.

Net sales for the first nine months of this year were \$175,820,000, an increase of 3 percent over net sales of \$171,083,000 for the comparable period last year.

Earnings for the first three quarters were \$13,642,000 or \$1.45 per share in 1961, and \$15,696,000 or \$1.67 per share in 1960.

Demand for most industrial chemicals shows improvement but over-capacity within the industry has intensified competition, depressed some prices and reduced profit margins.

Charges for depreciation are up this year reflecting completion of new facilities late in 1960 and in 1961.

Hurricane damage to several major plants of the company's customers resulted in some cancelled orders and reduced operations at nearby Stauffer plants for several weeks during September.

Development of the large trona mine and construction of the refinery at Green River, Wyo., continue satisfactorily with completion scheduled for mid-1962.

Work is on schedule at the new chlorine plant at Dominguez, and the salt cake expansion at Westend.
