Today's Meet May Clinch So. Calif. Championship For El Camino's Squad

Bidding for an upset win which would provide a sparkling finish to an already fine water polo campaign, El Camino College poloists will vie for the Southern California Championship at Cerritos in a meet ending today.

Already assured of a second place in the Metropolitan Conference, the Warriors will be up against the two top squads from all of the junior college water polo conferences in Southern California.

Favored, as usual, will be Long Beach, perennial Metro champ, who has a strangle hold on the Southern Calif. crown. Ranked immediately behind the Vikings will be Fullerton and two darkhorse clubs, host Cerritos and ECC.

Cerritos is competing in its first year of water polo, but boasts a rugged, aggressive squad capable of putting the skids to any of the more highly touted teams.

ECC will meet the Falcons in the first round of the tournament.

Last year, the Tribe swept to a fourth place finish among the water polo elite in this tourney.

Warming up for the playoffs, El Camino ventured into the realm of the four-year colleges once again and absorbed a 12 to 5 licking at the hands of host Long Beach State on Wednesday.

As he has done in practically every game all season, Selden Clair topped the Warrior point-getters, connecting for four goals.
