'62 Brings Realization of Many Projects Planned in Previous Years, States Chace

In a New Year's message issued today, Supervisor Burton W. Chace predicted that "1962 will bring into realization many important projects which were planned in previous years."

The most important, Chace said, will be the opening of the Marina Del Rey Small Craft Harbor, expected to be the largest small craft harbor in the world.

"This Marina has been the hope and dream of many people for more than 50 years. I am very pleased that the County of Los Angeles and our office, in particular, will finally be able to make this dream a reality," he said.

More than 6,000 boats will be berthed in the Marina when it is fully completed. The first segment, accommodating some 2,000 craft, will probably be in operation either in late Spring or early

PLANS COMPLETED
Turning to the Palos Verdes Peninsula, Chace said bids will be called for next year on the proposed new million-dollar Los Verdes Golf Course overlooking the Pacific Ocean at the tip of the Peninsula. Engineering plans have been completed for the project by the County Engineer's Office and architect Arthur Froehlich.

Chace pointed out that all county golf courses are self-supporting and revenue producing.

In its continuing program to bring the courts closer to the people, ground will be broken for the new Superior Court Building in Torrance in the New Year ahead.

The New Year will also usher in partial opening of the 87-acre South Coastal Botanic Garden in Rolling Hills Estates. Rest of the

project will be completed as soon as possible, Chace said.

FACILITIES DOUBLED
Another project which will be completed in 1962 and be in operation will be the Hermosa Beach County Library. Parking facilities at Torrance County Beach will be more than doubled, and parking for additional 50 cars will be provided at the Compton Courthouse.

Another important project will be moving of the Regional Probation Office to the Torrance Civic Center. Land for the office has been donated by the City of Torrance.

PROGRESS NOTED
"These are only some of the major projects which will be realized in 1962," Chace declared. "There will be many, many more improvements of all kinds, such as roads and minor repairs on buildings, which are too numerous to mention. But it is evident that many things will be accomplished in the Fourth Supervisorial District next year."

Just three of the past year's major accomplishments mentioned by Chace were the opening of the new Animal Shelter at Broadway and Victoria in the Carson Area; extension of Hawthorne Blvd. from Silver Spur to Palos Verdes Dr. North in Rolling Hills Estates and the land purchased for Lomita Civic Center.
